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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Each year that rolls along brings change to Centennial and all of us, fact of life as it is, but at these moments of reflection, I am always amazed at how MUCH change has occurred! Whether by planning or reacting, it has been another big year for Centennial Mental Health Center.

As a result of multi-year planning, this year brought us across the finish line with two large capital projects, both of which open doors to continued evolution and change for Centennial within the broader healthcare community. Later in this report, you will see references to our new Electronic Health Record "Avatar" and get a glimpse of the kind of impact it will bring to our quality of care and ability to collaborate actively with other healthcare providers. While we are all still on the learning curve and making adjustments to the system, it is already proving its value.

Also in this report, we are celebrating the completion of our Morgan Integrated Care building project! Long anticipated, this was a huge undertaking for Centennial as the first clinic we have designed and built from the ground up. Even more important, it includes, for the first time, space for providing integrated primary care within our walls, which we will be staffing in coordination with our neighbor Salud Health Center. We continue to invest in "integrated healthcare" in other locations and programs as well, and recognize that our part of improving overall health and wellness in our communities is essential.

As with any organization, sometimes external forces also move us toward change. FY 15-16 did bring along challenges in our Medicaid revenue stream, but we ultimately weathered the storm and were able to end the year positively. In part related to these challenges, Centennial's Board and Leaders team met together in May for a strategic planning effort that helped us get refocused on our "essentials", specifically our goals to deliver quality services, in a locally responsive and fiscally sound way. We also worked on ways to adapt our organizational management structure, particularly around how our dispersed counties and offices are grouped under regional directors. While still a work in progress, this reorganization of our Leaders team is already showing its value, particularly around our "locally responsive" service goal!

Centennial can only accomplish what we do with the active support and collaboration of our clients, community stakeholders and all those who recognize the critical needs for behavioral health services in our far-flung communities. I hope you hear this more than once a year, but please hear my sincere thanks for all that YOU do to move lives forward!

PAST PRESIDENT'S LETTER

When I returned to eastern Colorado subsequent to finishing my graduate studies in St. Louis, I brought in tow my young bride and our infant son. The transition from city life to that in a small town was challenging for Valerie and she struggled to find her niche. The untimely death of her only sister created a tipping point for her in terms of her mental health and an eating disorder that had been in remission since her high school days reappeared. I was a caseworker at the time, working in child protection, and even though I was supposed to understand mental illness, at times our lives felt overwhelming and out of control.

At that time in 1976, Centennial Mental Health Center had very little outreach in the hinterlands. If I recall, a therapist traveled to Yuma and Wray one day a week to provide therapy. Our only real option for dealing with Valerie's anorexia/bulimia was a private counselor in Ft. Collins. He wanted to see her 50 minutes, once a week—a nearly 3-hour one-way trip which she often made with a baby beside her.

Ultimately a lack of support services and a lack of intensive clinical services along with increasingly worse depression on Valerie's part led to her death at the age of 29. The children and I were devastated and it has been my mission in life to promote quality mental health services in rural Colorado.

I would like to say that everything is fixed now. I really would like to say that, but it would be less than candid. In truth, many people are still struggling with access issues to quality mental health services. But here's the thing—it is so much better today than it was forty years ago. Centennial Mental Health Center now has satellite offices in Akron, Yuma, Wray, Burlington, Cheyenne Wells, Julesburg, Holyoke, Limon, Elizabeth, Ft. Morgan and Sterling, and I think that this is something worth celebrating.

One of the crowning achievements this past year has been the completion of the new building in Morgan County. This state-of-the-art facility has the capacity for integrated care—physical and behavioral health, many group rooms, play therapy rooms, and counseling offices. It is a beautiful edifice and should serve the community for many years to come.

I have served on the Centennial Mental Health Center Board of Directors for twenty years. During my tenure on the board, I have witnessed many evolutionary changes in the delivery of mental health. The availability of tele-psychiatry, evidenced-based intervention strategies, enhanced substance abuse treatment, and greatly improved crisis services, including a respite facility have expanded Centennial Mental Health Center's capacity to reach into the community and provide quality mental health services.

Attracting and retaining quality staff, Medicaid expansion issues, along with meeting State and Federal regulations remains a challenge, but as a member of the Centennial Mental Health Center Board, I am confident that we will continue to work hard towards the goal of insuring the delivery of high quality mental health services throughout northeast Colorado. To paraphrase the words of Robert Frost, "We have promises to keep, and miles to go before we sleep, and miles to go before we sleep."


