IN CASE YOU MISSED IT - STATE CRISIS RFP INFORMATION FROM LIZ

Some of you, particularly those that are part of Centennial's Crisis Services team, had a "heads up" last week that Centennial and other providers within the Colorado Crisis Services are facing a major challenge in regard to future contracting with the state. Colorado DHS's Office of Behavioral Health posted a "Request for Proposal" on September 4th that throws several monkey wrenches into the statewide crisis system that has developed over the past 5 years. When our Board met on the 13th, I provided some of my concerns around funding and program changes that could significantly change how mobile crisis response could be delivered, under the state contract at least, and our Board has gotten fired up and into their role as ADVOCATES for mental health! One column was published just last Friday in a couple of our local papers, and it may be shared in others over weeks ahead. There are other places and ways this message may be coming out and I just wanted you to have some context for the messages. The "worst case scenarios" as noted in the article above are real in that the current level of funding set aside for the region most of our counties would fall into within this newly defined regional geography is grossly, and I believe unfairly, underfunded. For that and many other reasons, we are at the table wherever we can to plan for solutions and forward appropriate tough questions back to OBH (completed last Friday) that will hopefully give them pause about some of the "unintended consequences" that many of us believe this RFP would set in motion. Along with funding, we are pressing hard on ways that stated program changes could undercut rural crisis response, for instance around this funding being disallowed for responses to our rural hospital partners.

While I cannot provide any guarantees, I am hopeful that somehow this RFP may be slowed down, corrected, or simply stopped altogether. Existing crisis contracts go through this fiscal year and there may be alternative ways of extending such contracts, which statewide are embedded into the community behavioral system as one facet of the broader safety net we provide. Especially at this time of Governor Hickenlooper's final months in office, it is possible that our next Governor and his cabinet might see this differently.

So, if you have concerns about how any of this evolving situation could affect Centennial, you or your position, please speak up with your supervisor, one of the Leaders team or route them to me directly as you wish. I will keep you posted as we hope and work for better news!

If you get "fired up" yourself and want to express yourself on the subject, feel free to do so as an individual who lives and works in these communities. It may be best NOT to identify yourself directly as a Centennial employee, lest some just take your opinion as coming from someone "feathering their own nest", but general impressions you have as a community member or behavioral health provider around the importance of the crisis response system in our Northeast counties is absolutely fine! Most of our

area county commissioners are already clued in and Senator Sonnenberg will be in the next day or so; coordinated advocacy at the Governor's office is also occurring. It is not required but any means, but I'd love to know about any such advocacy you move forward on your own as well.

Thanks for listening and, most importantly, CARING about our communities and clients, including those we haven't met yet!
