Another amazing woman unknown in history Elizabeth Ann Seton

(One of the first Social Workers)

Elizabeth was born in New York City in 1774 and at the age of 19, she married William Seton and had five children. She and her sister-in-law became involved in social work and organized the Protestant Sisters of Charity to help the poor.


Due to her husband's tuberculosis the sailed to Italy in an effort to save his life. She was left a widow at 29 in a strange country without her children. During this time she was attracted to the Catholic faith and was able to return to American where he joined the Catholic Church. She was invited to Baltimore by a Bishop and moved her children there where she opened a school next to St. Mary Sanctuary. This was the first free Catholic school in America. She opened a school in Emmitsburg for poor children.

Despite the loss of her oldest daughter in 1812, she persevered and established a community with her Sisters of Charity in 1813. In 1816 her youngest daughter died. Elizabeth too died of tuberculosis in 1821. The first miracle credited to her intercession was the cure of a nun with cancer in Louisiana.

SHE WAS CANONIZED IN 1975 BY POPE PAUL VI.

(She is the Patron Saint of: death of children, loss of parents, opposition of Church authorities, and widows.
